What Are My Housing Options?

There are many different housing options in Toronto (visit www.settlement.org for information on housing):

Apartment	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Usually owned by a landlord and have a superintendent who lives in the building
Condominium (Condo)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Have a board of directors who manage the building and land• You pay a monthly fee to the condo, called maintenance fees
Co-operative (co-ops)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Like a condo but you own shares of the entire building• Co-ops can decide to accept or reject buyers or tenants
Duplex/Triplex	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 2 or 3 separate homes on top of each other
Room (shared accommodation)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• A room that you rent or buy. Usually, everyone who lives in the home shares the kitchen, bathroom and living rooms
House	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Houses can be connected to each other or separated. These can be very expensive in Toronto

Renting a Place in Toronto

You have legal rights when you rent a home from someone. Your landlord cannot act against you based on any of the following:

- Race/ethnicity, or religion
- Sex, age, marriage status
- Sexual orientation
- Disability

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Buying a Place Toronto

Finding a place in Toronto can be hard. The Canadian Real Estate Association suggests you can take the following steps:

- 1) Find a Realtor or Real Estate Agent: Licensed Realtors can help you find the place you want. You do not pay for a realtor if you are buying a place. The seller pays your realtor's fees.
- 2) Check what mortgage you can afford by talking to different banks and other options. You can learn more at www.itpaystoknow.gc.ca
- 3) Save for your down payment. If your down payment is less than 20% of the home price, you will need to get mortgage insurance which can cost 0.6%-3.9% of your mortgage.



The Government has tax credits for first time home buyers. Talk to your real estate agent or accountant for more information.

Central Neighbourhood House (CNH): If you are living on the street and do not have a home, CNH can help with filling out Toronto Community Housing applications, getting identification and offer support.
